One-Time Homeless Prevention Funds Available!

MISSION

The Rooster Relief Fund proactively prevents homelessness by providing one-time financial assistance to households who do not qualify for government grants or other existing preventive services.

Named in honor of retired Allentown School District homeless liaison, Russell "Rooster" Valentini, the program is administered by the Lehigh Valley Homeless Advisory Board Prevention Action Team.

HOW IT WORKS

1. Up to \$1,500 in financial assistance

Funds **may only** be used to prevent a currently housed individual or family in the Lehigh Valley from losing their housing. Funds may be used for rental or mortgage assistance (and in exceptional circumstances, relocation relief).

In general, persons and families who meet the "Asset-Limited, Income-Constrained, Employed" (ALICE) criteria may benefit from the Rooster Relief Fund.

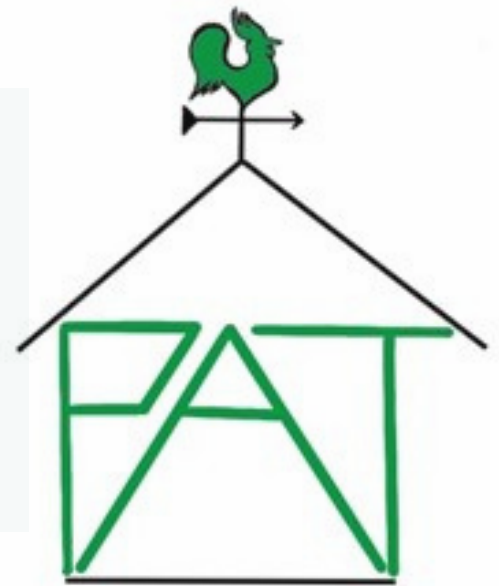
2. Have a client representative

The individual or household must have a client representative to assist them with navigating the process. This includes case management to ensure the application is properly and promptly completed and to ensure needed further assistance.

The Prevention Action Team can assist households in obtaining a client representative from a LVRHAB-member agency.

3. Do not qualify for other funding

The Rooster Relief Fund was formed to assist those who do not qualify for funding from other, existing homeless prevention resources (must not qualify for assistance through the 211/Coordinated Entry System).
